schedule to speak at length about a recent wave of burglaries in Coral Gate. Also in attendance was Commander Papier of the Miami Police Department and members of his team. The officers

informed their attentive audience that the rise in crime follows a national trend but that Coral Gate continues to

What is Miami 21?

A fresh new look at urban planning and how it affects you.

Miami 21 is a zoning plan for the Miami of the 21st Century. The farreaching vision of Miami 21 takes into account all the integral factors that will make each area within our City a unique, vibrant place to live, learn, work and play. It provides a new vision for the City that will be supported by clear guidelines and regulations that ensure future generations will reap the benefits of well-balanced neighborhoods and a rich quality of life.

Part of the Miami 21 vision is a form-based zoning code where the emphasis of the code is placed on the "form" (shape/configuration) of a structure and

the relationship of buildings to each other, to streets and to open spaces - rather than emphasis on its "use."

The form-based code includes principles which focus on a greater mix of housing, commercial and retail uses, transit and pedestrian oriented communities, and preserves open spaces.

911 AND CELL PHONES

When an emergency arises at home and you must dial 911, call from your house phone. These calls are automatically routed to the correct emergency dispatcher based on your address. If you must use your cell phone, tell the dispatcher you live in the city of

Miami as you relay your address. Cell phone calls are transmitted by towers that cross municipal boundaries. Calls from our area are not automatically

routed to a Miami dispatcher.
Commander Papier, from the
Coral Way/Brickell NET area,
addressed this at our Crime
Watch meeting following up on
incident in which a Gate
resident called 911 and was
rerouted to several dispatchers
before the crisis was resolved.

CONNECT WITH YOUR NEIGHBORS

Many of us Coral Gate residents share information via email on a daily basis. If you don't have a computer, share your home or cell phone number with neighbors so they can contact

you in case of an emergency.

WHEN TO CALL 311

311 is a non-emergency number you can call for government questions or services like:

- · Order new recycling bins
- Ask for potholes to be repaired
- Report violations like overgrown lots or junk/trash piles
- Request a stop sign or traffic signal be installed at a busy intersection

...have had items like cars, bicycles, plasma TVs, jewelry, and computers stolen from our homes. According to police data, since July 2007, we've had over 15 home burglaries, 5 stolen cars and 10 motor vehicle larcenies. Quite frankly, we're all fed up and concerned about our properties and families. In addition to helping us start our Citizens' Crime Watch, here are some crime prevention tips the officers shared:

- Never open your door to strangers. Install a peephole if you don't have one.
- Get to know your neighbors;
 look out for each other.
- Report suspicious people and slow-driving cars to the police nonemergency number: 305-579-6111.



- Join our new Coral Gate
 Citizens Crime Watch.
 Know who's the lead person
 in your block or volunteer to
 be that person if your block
 has no one assigned.
- Patrol the neighborhood, take a few extra minutes to drive around before you get home.
- Consider installing better outdoor lighting or locks.
- Lock all gates, doors and windows.

WHAT'S R1?

Single family residential zoning code. Our homes (all 463 of them; built between 1948 and 1950) are zoned **R1**. Adherence to this code gives us low density and low traffic and makes Coral Gate one of the most desirable communities within the City of Miami.

NOISE ORDINANCE

Miami laws restrict noise between 11PM and 7AM. Please observe these hours.

TRASH PICKUP

The city picks up household garbage on Tuesdays and Fridays. Yard trash is picked up on Thursdays. DON'T FORGET! Don't put out your garbage before the scheduled day. You could be fined \$75.00 per day!

Nearest solid waste dump site: 1290 NW 20 St. Open Monday to Sunday, 7:00 am - 5:30 pm. (305) 575-5107.

PARKING

Vehicles can only park on driveways or swale areas, otherwise you may be fined. Don't park on sidewalks either or you may be fined.

SCOOP THAT POOP

All dogs must be on a leash when walking with their owners and all canine "gifts" must be promptly removed. No one needs the extra fertilizer, thank you.

YARD SALES

You need a permit from the city to have a yard/garage sale (you can have up to 2 a year). Get 'em at:
